The University of California at San Diego's Engaged Learning Tools has four components to help student guide their learning and career preparation: REAL Portal, Co-Curricular Record, Enhanced Electronic Transcript, and the ePortfolio. The University of Central Oklahoma will share more about the challenges it had to overcome to create the Student Transformative Learning Record.
