Incrementalism is inadequate a strategy for our current moment. Philip Rogers, senior vice president of the American Council on Education, says that the future success of university presidents will depend "on their ability to reinvent themselves and their institutions every five years, to keep up with the pace of change." Presidents must foster "disruptive innovation" if they are to ensure that their institutions survive and thrive. But how to create an innovative university? How realistic is it for any college or university to "reinvent themselves" once, let alone every five years? This presentation will argue that, in order to reinvent themselves, universities might establish an incubator to create and nurture many experimental colleges that are innovative reinventions. Rather than remaking the entire institution, universities might instead develop a portfolio of experimental autonomous units within the university, thereby spreading the risk of innovation across the entire portfolio.

As we found in the spring when campuses closed, many universities struggled with how to maintain community amidst remote learning. We know that connectedness is vital to student success, yet do we know how to build community and connectedness in a virtual environment? What have we in higher education learned since spring and what changes have we made to foster community online this fall? How can we truly foster social connectedness amongst learners in a remote or hybrid modality? In this session, we'll evaluate the community of inquiry framework and how that is being applied to online learning. According to the community of inquiry framework, there are three required elements for a strong community: Cognitive, Social, and Teaching Presence. Social Presence is defined as "the ability of participants to identify with the community (e.g., course of study), communicate purposefully in a trusting environment, and develop interpersonal relationships by way of projecting their individual personalities" (Garrison, 2009). Social presence is the piece we typically find is lacking in online learning. In this presentation, we'll dive into why communities are so valuable in learning and how to best replicate that in the online environment. Artificial Intelligence (AI) is rapidly becoming ubiquitous in every aspect of our lives and work, especially in the context of our educational institutions. With the help of several national partners, the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education (WICHE) has recently completed a two-year research initiative on the impact prior learning assessment (PLA) can have on student success. As part of this work, WICHE and the Council for Adult and Experiential Learning (CAEL) analyzed data from more than 230,000 adult students across 72 institutions. Findings from this study - and the larger landscape analysis - suggest that policies and practices that support prior learning assessment have the potential to create more efficient pathways and increase student success. Findings also suggest that PLA has a significant impact on credential completion for students historically underrepresented in higher education. Yet, barriers to accessing PLA persist for students of color and students from poverty-impacted backgrounds. Join us in a discussion on the implications of this research initiative and how to use the findings to advocate for changes in PLA policies and practices at your institution to improve student success.
